Bilingual Speech and Language Pathologist

The Speech and Language Pathologist (SLP) is responsible for delivering instruction to identified students as specified in Individual Education Plans (IEPs), working with inclusion teachers and classroom teachers to provide modifications and accommodations, as well as supporting teachers in developing a classroom environment that supports differentiated instruction and student progress. The Bilingual Speech and Language Pathologist should be able to deliver instruction in Spanish and English. While the SLP has primary responsibility to identified students, they are expected to support the success of all Capital City students. The SLP works on a related services team with another full-time SLP and an Occupational Therapist.

This is a 10-month position, which is exempt and therefore not eligible for overtime pay under the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act.

Responsibilities include, but are not limited to:

- Conduct thorough assessment and diagnosis of articulation and language disorders of students who are undergoing a special education evaluation in these areas. Conduct informal and formal screenings of students who are possible candidates for special education referral as identified by the Director(s) of Student Services (DSS) and the Child Study Team (CST). Conduct triennial re-evaluations of students who receive speech and language services.
- Deliver specialized instruction to caseload students as specified in student IEPs. The SLP is expected to start service delivery during the first week of school. Be present, timely, and prepared for direct service. Notify the DSS in advance if you will not be present for individual or group sessions or meetings.
- Participate in the development of Individual Education Plans (IEPs) for students who qualify for speech language therapy as a related service. Create goals and objectives for students that are based on assessment of current needs. Regularly assess students' IEP progress and communicate progress to families each quarter. Maintain speech and language evaluation reports, IEP goals, and progress notes in student IEP folders.
- Collaborate with general education teachers, special education teachers and other related service providers to identify instructional strategies and accommodations and modifications that promote student success in all content areas.
- Maintain and/or update the Speech and Language evaluation materials, therapeutic equipment and supplies.

- Provide occasional staff development for teachers in the areas of speech pathology that are relevant to instruction and academic progress.
- Regularly input and maintain service notes in the Special Education Data System (SEDS) and note student progress on quarterly IEP Progress Reports.

Professional Requirements:

- Masters degree in Speech and Language Pathology, Communication Sciences and Disorders, or related field
- ASHA certification preferred
- Fluency in Spanish
- 2 or more years experience as a school-based or youth Speech and Language Pathologist
