Capital City Public Charter School enables a diverse group of students to meet high expectations; develop creativity, critical thinking, and problem-solving skills; achieve deep understanding of complex subjects; and acquire a love of learning along with a strong sense of community and character. We graduate young adults who are self-directed, intellectually engaged, and possess a commitment to personal and civic responsibility.



#### History

Capital City was founded in 2000 by a committed group of parents and educators. The school began as a Pre-K-8th grade program and then, motivated by the lack of small, public college preparatory programs in DC, amended its charter to add a high school program. Following a robust planning process, the High School opened in 2008 and graduated its first class of seniors in 2012. Capital City now serves 981 students in grades PK-12 in a newly renovated facility.

Capital City has been an EL Education (formerly Expeditionary Learning) school since its inception. EL Education emphasizes projectbased instruction to help students meet rigorous academic and character standards. Capital City has been recognized as an EL Education Mentor School and hosts many visitors annually.

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

# **Capital City Student Body**



Capital City's **333** high school students hail from all parts of the city. The school is one of the most **racially and culturally diverse** schools in Washington, DC. Capital City is a Title I School with 80% low-income students.



#### Curriculum

Capital City's curriculum focuses on teaching the deeper learning skills that students will need to be successful in college and beyond. Multidisciplinary learning expeditions, a cornerstone of our program, allow students to delve deeply into course material, make connections, and emerge with new understandings. Problem-solving, critical thinking, collaboration, and communication are emphasized in all courses.



All Capital City students engage in a challenging, college preparatory curriculum. For 2016-17 we offer:

AP Language, AP Literature and Composition, AP Spanish Language and Culture, AP Human Geography, AP Environmental Science, AP Physics, and AP Statistics. Other core courses at Capital City are offered with an open honor options where students who elect to take courses with honors extend their learning by completing additional course requirements.

Students in all grades complete a portfolio of work that provides evidence of mastery of learning targets. At the end of each semester, students present portfolios to their advisors and families in student-led portfolio conferences. All 10th grade students must complete and present a more rigorous passage portfolio to a panel comprised of faculty and community members. Successful passage requires that students demonstrate mastery of skills, strong communication, and understanding of themselves as a learner.

As seniors, students design and execute their own personal learning expeditions, a requirement of graduation. As part of the process, students complete an in-depth research paper and annotated bibliography, conduct fieldwork, meet with experts, and design an authentic product to benefit the community. Seniors present the work of their expedition to a panel prior to graduation.

#### Faculty

Dedicated and experienced teachers are a hallmark of our program. Of our 37 high school faculty members, 100% are Highly Qualified and 84% have advanced degrees. The student to faculty ratio is 13:1.

#### **Grading/GPA Calculation**

Capital City uses a Standards Based System for grading. For each class, a minimum of 2.0 is required to earn credit. This is equivalent to a "C" in a traditional letter based grading system. Capital City sets a high standard for mastery and does not accept or give credit for "D"s earned at other schools.

Honors, Dual Enrollment and AP courses receive an additional weighting. For honors courses, students receive an additional .5 Quality Points. Students receive an additional 1.0 Quality Points for AP and Dual Enrollment Courses.

Capital City does not rank students. Capital City also does not have an honor roll or Dean's list.
