Mission

CAPITAL CITY enables a diverse group of students to meet high expectations; develop creativity, critical thinking, and problem-solving skills; achieve deep understanding of complex subjects; and acquire a love of learning along with a strong sense of community and character. We will graduate young adults who are self-directed, intellectually engaged, and possess a commitment to personal and civic responsibility.

History

CAPITAL CITY was founded in 2000 by a committed group of parents and educators making it the first parent-founded charter school in DC. The school began as a PreK-8th grade program in Columbia Heights. Motivated by the lack of small, public college preparatory programs in DC, Capital City amended its charter in 2006 to add a high school program. Following a robust planning process, the High School opened in 2008 and graduated its first class of seniors in 2012. Since then, 100% of seniors in each graduating class has been accepted to college.

In 2012, Capital City completed a \$24-million state-of-the-art renovation of the former Rabaut School building in Ward 4, and relocated the entire school to this site. The school now serves 981 students in grades PK3-12. There is a Lower School (PK3-4), Middle School (5-8) and High School (9-12) each with its own principal and staff providing the learning environment of a small school on each campus.

Approach

CAPITAL CITY offers an innovative approach to teaching and learning using the EL Education model school-wide to support students in meeting rigorous academic and character standards. Through this model, students engage in learning expeditions—long-term, in-depth investigations of compelling topics that include authentic research, fieldwork and service, and result in high quality products.

A strong focus on the social curriculum creates structures that build students' capacity to be strong, independent workers and thinkers. An approach to educating the whole child incorporates arts, fitness and wellness into the curriculum. Many features of our school program can be directly linked to the success in closing the achievement gap, including low student-teacher ratios, an approach to tailoring instruction to each individual learner, and the use of data to inform differentiated instruction.


